The 2024 eclipse – what an experience! It was such a rare, natural phenomenon. With approximately 4 minutes of totality and near perfect weather, hushed crowds sat in awe as the moon completely cloaked the sun.

Madison County hosted over 16 official events that welcomed Madison County residents and guests from afar. All of our hotels were sold out for many months in advance, and the majority of the campsites were also sold out for the extended weekend. Many of our restaurants and shops have commented on the extra retail traffic over the weekend and their many conversations with out-of-town guests. After listening to and reading recaps from many of these event sites, we discovered we were hosts to approximately 10,000 viewers with representation from over 30 states and 4 countries.

The Anderson Madison County Visitors Bureau was honored to be one of the few locations offering free eclipse glasses, as well as a strong communication point and advertiser for all the official eclipse events across the county. We also had the wonderful experience of partnering with the Madison County Chamber of Commerce, the City of Anderson, and the Anderson Regional Airport to plan the Throwing Some Shade eclipse experience at the airport. Such a fun and dynamic team! Kudos also the Madison County EMA for their emergency planning, and the Madison County Health Department for supporting many of the eclipse events for on-site services.

Activities that bring visitors to our county increase our tax base from restaurants, shopping, lodging, gas, etc. These visits provide us an opportunity to showcase our overall quality of place. That visit may spark an interest for repeat trips, or even a potential move to our communities. A little Hoosier Hospitality goes a long way!



A HISTORIC COLLABORATION IN MADISON COUNTY

Recently the Madison County Chamber hosted a first of its kind collaboration session with elected leaders from 10 of our individual municipalities. The purpose of this session is to debut the efforts being made for Madison County to pursue the Stellar Pathways Program designation by the State of Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs. This designation carries with it millions in state grant funds and would signal to the entire state that our region is committed to a prosperous future.

Among the many topics being discussed in these sessions is the formation of a strategic investment plan that allows our municipalities to set regional priorities and work together on projects in a way never seen before in our county. These projects will all have a similar theme of connecting our

communities and will be focused on having clearly defined and measurable outcomes. Examples of these outcomes include population growth, increased educational attainment rates, increased per capita incomes and many more.

While the Madison County Chamber is the lead applicant on this project, this is the result of a full team effort within our municipal and nonprofit partner groups. Organizations like the Madison County and South Madison community foundations, Madison County Economic Development, and the Anderson Madison County Visitors Bureau are all playing integral roles in the formation of our strategic investment plan and pulling together many other community stakeholders for this historic Madison County venture!
