On Tuesday, Sept. 17, the Madison County Community Foundation will hold its first Celebration of Philanthropy dinner.

In addition to awarding \$100,000 in grants and providing updates about the Foundation's work in our community, the event will also be an opportunity to hear from three local "everyday philanthropist" couples who will share their perspectives on local impact through giving. Individually and collectively, their stories of giving illustrate how the community foundation model lives out its goal of being For good, Forever, For everyone.

For good: Grants from the Foundation reflect Madison County's unique people, issues, and ideas, and represent all sectors of our community including Arts, Culture, and History, Health and Human Services, Education, Thriving Community (animal welfare, recreation, parks, etc.), and Women and Children. Our variety of grant opportunities and cycles helps us support long-term solutions,

respond quickly to emergencies, and meet the changing social, cultural, and educational needs our community faces.

Forever: Our focus on endowed, or "permanent" funds, helps ensure that participating agencies and funded partners have a sustainable source of perpetual revenue that never dries up. When a fund is endowed, it grows forever as only the earnings and interest are distributed as grants (or scholarships). Over time, an endowed fund can have many times the charitable impact compared to a non-endowed fund.

For everyone: You don't have to be wealthy to contribute to the Foundation. Anyone can contribute a gift of any amount to any of the Foundation's 200+ existing, named funds. And, for those who would like to establish their own new fund, matching dollars are available for certain kinds of funds, to amplify the donor's investment.

MOUNDS LAKE – IMAGINE THE FUTURE OF MADISON COUNTY

As summer continues to play out with its festivals, thunderstorms, and sunny hot days, Mounds Lake continues to gain statewide attention as the regional water shortage becomes more highlighted. In an effort to create economic development in the metro region, the proposed reservoir project in Madison County, Mounds Lake, would contribute 35 billion gallons of water storage along the White River corridor. The Project would provide the much needed water resource for Central Indiana for the next 100 years, adding millions of gallons of water daily, as well as assisting with flood control during rainy seasons.

Could you imagine a few years from now when the boating industry is the leading economic driver in Madison County? Boating, jet skiing, tubing, fishing, camping, and so

much more are just the start of the recreational activities that would attract visitors from near and far. Not to mention the local property values increasing with the addition of lakeview homes, condos, and apartments. All encompassed by surrounding trails that would connect these amenities and align with the new Madison County Park Board Plan.

The future of the water need is clear, and the quality of life in Madison County will increase dramatically with a project of this magnitude...will you join us for a swim?
